You can always get Mom a new mobile phone, laptop or digital camera.

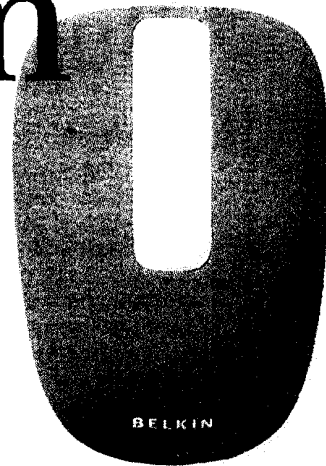
But for a truly remarkable Mother's Day, what about a robot? Or an outfit made of special fabric that fends off heat and perspiration? Or a new techno gadget?

Wildbleu fashions use technical fabrics that promise to whisk away heat and perspiration. Prices start at \$20.

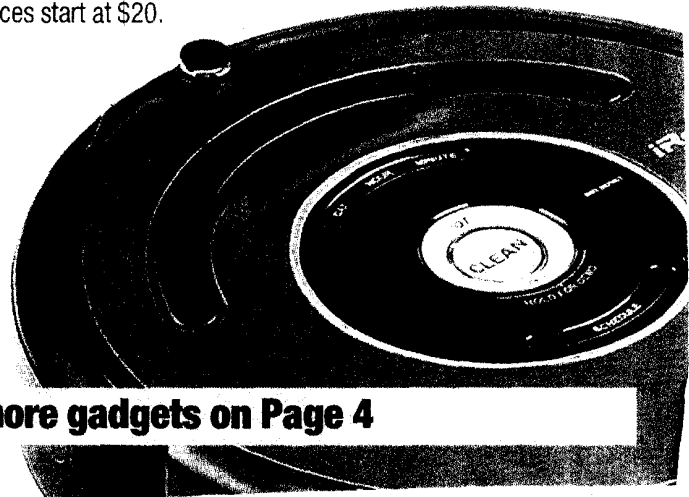


A mouse you can wash

iRobot's products promise to vacuum or scrub your floors. Prices start at \$150.



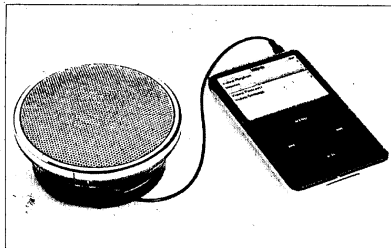

HIGH-TECH PRESENTS FOR THE MODERN MOM

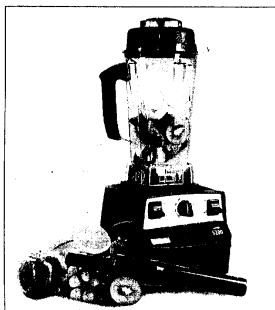

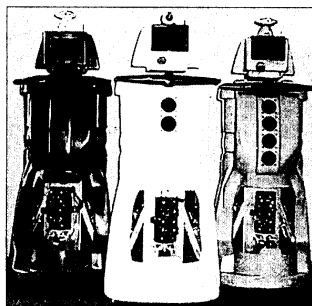
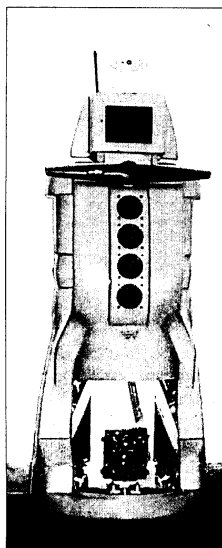
So even if she says "it's the thought that counts," you might want to think about something totally different.

What about a robot? Or an outfit made of special fabric that fends off heat and perspiration? Or any number of techno gaggets?

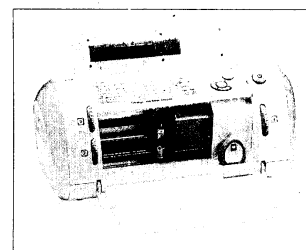
Here are some possible gifts for moms of all ages and in many price ranges:



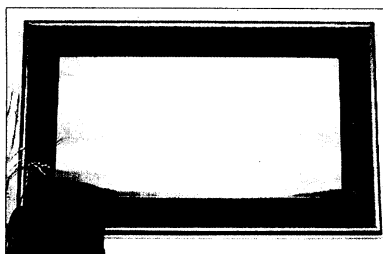
Product: Vita-Mix 5200
Why it's cool: OK, so we're going to provide at least one appliance for the die-hard gourmet cooks. This blender goes up to 240 mph and can blend the entire fruit or vegetable, including skin, core, seeds and stems. It doesn't contain bisphenol-A, the plastic chemical that is under investigation for leaching into food and has "copolyester," a plastic-like material that is shatterproof and dampens noise.

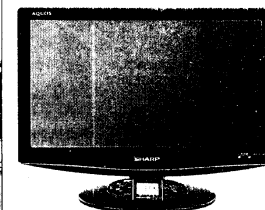
Product: Cricut home die cutting machine
